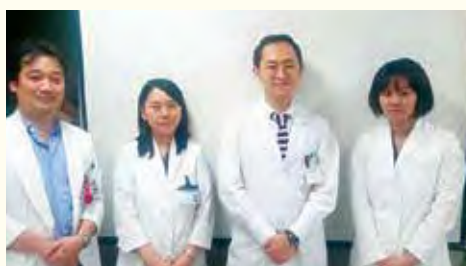
We hope VIS helps to cultivate intercultural communications and boost international exchanges.

It was my honor to participate in clinical clerkship at Department of Psychiatry, Hokkaido University Hospital. All staffs in Department of Psychiatry are extremely enthusiastic in patient-centered care, medical education, and clinical research. It was very impressive that medical students of Hokkaido University are

also actively participating in their clinical clerkship with plenty of discussion with their supervisors and watching video lectures about clinical medicine in their free time in hospital. I could feel how much they dedicate to medical care.

I was able to participate bed side learning in Department of Psychiatry as a student doctor. On the first week of my bed side learning, I could conduct a psychiatric interview together with three 5th year medical students in Hokkaido University. It was a great chance to perform a psychiatric mental status examination and evaluate core symptoms of schizophrenia. Since professor gave us a feedback for this case and the medical record written by us, I can deepen my clinical understanding of schizophrenia. On the last week of my bed

side learning, I went to psychiatric ward and conducted psychiatric interview every day with a hospitalized patient of bipolar disorder. Through writing progress note of the patient every day, I could experience how bipolar disorder stabilized with medication and psychotherapy. Moreover, I could have a chance to use Hamilton Rating Scale for Depression, Montgomery-Asberg Depression Rating Scale, and Young Mania Rating Scale for the patient to evaluate the severity of current mood episode as a member of medical team in Department of Psychiatry.

It was very lucky to take clinical attachment in Hokkaido University Hospital. I feel really grateful to all staffs in Department of Psychiatry and looking forward to meet them again.

them, Sapporo is definitely the best! I really appreciate the opportunity to take part in international program and hope to visit the Hokkaido University again in the near future.

I chose overseas medical practice for 2 weeks in Hokkaido University.

The first week was at the Acute and Critical Care Medicine department, which consists of emergency rooms and ICU. It was a slightly different system from Korea where emergency rooms and ICU are separated. Unlike Korea, emergency room was not very busy and doctors spent a lot of time treating 1 patient. It was very impressive that doctors were very careful not to get contaminated when they perform surgical procedures in the emergency room and many medical staff (about 3 doctors and 3 nurses) were taking care when the patient went down to CT. I spent most of my time in the emergency room and sometimes I had a medical practice in ICU. There was a lecture every day. Also, I experienced night shift that I had never done in Korea. It was a valuable experience.

The second week was at the Orthopedic Surgery department. All the professors and doctors taught me very kindly about every patient and it was very impressive that the doctors introduced the students to the patients who were assigned directly to the

students. There were opportunities to observe the outpatient treatment, which was markedly different from the Korean university hospital. Unlike Korea where the outpatient treatment was very short, it took more than 15 minutes to treat 1 patient and 'Raport' between the patient and the doctor was particularly impressive. The patients really respect the doctors and doctors also respect patients and listen attentively to their voices. It seemed to me that doctors and patients worked together for a cure that I could see in the textbook.

There also were opportunities to participate in operation. Before I came, I was curious about how different Japanese operation room and system are from those of Korea, but there was no difference except their own gowns and hats. However, the atmosphere of operation room was very soft and free compared to Korea.

Though it was a short period of 2 weeks, it was a great opportunity to experience the Japanese medicine culture and the system. The first thing I was impressed was the kindness of the doctors. Although communication was not smooth, they always
