y first research elective in Hokkaido University was in systems neuroscience. In systems neuroscience department, I was assigned to read the department's published research papers in order to grasp the concepts of the experiments done in the laboratory. The experiments were done on monkeys to measure the neuronal activities of monkeys in the basal ganglia. I had the opportunity to actually play a part in one of the experiments for a couple of days. Overall, I have learned about how behavioral modification can change the neuronal activities of the monkeys and how intrinsic motivation of monkeys has led them to learn how to do saccade in the required time after a reward has been given to them.

In the second research elective which was in cancer pathology, I have learned how to do DNA extraction, PCR and gel electrophoresis for biopsies taken of patients suspecting diffuse midline glioma and pleomorphic xanthoastrocytoma. I have also done sectioning of brain autopsy and we discussed the abnormalities seen in the autopsy and MRI. I have also been given the opportunity to attend the 37th International Sapporo Cancer Symposium which discussed about advances in molecular diagnosis of cancer.

n my 2 weeks in Hokkaido University Pediatrics department, I mainly spent time in outpatient clinics, procedure laboratories and the wards. Clinically, I managed to learn more about conditions that I have

learnt about previously and gain additional exposure to conditions that I have not seen in the Singaporean context. In Cardiology, I learnt more about Down's syndrome, atrioventricular septal defect, and saw rarer cases such as CHARGE syndrome and hypoplastic left heart syndrome. In Neurology, I furthered my understanding on seizures, observed an infant during an infantile spasm, and learnt more about EEGs (Electroencephalogram). I also had a very good non-clinical experience. Firstly, even though there was a slight language barrier, the doctors themselves were welcoming, approachable and friendly, and tried their best to make me feel like part of the team. I received plenty of guidance in terms of schedule and locations of places.

I managed to attend team lunches, which

was a good opportunity for me to learn more about the Japanese medical system, education system and also get to know the team better. I also really appreciate that the school arranged for us to be received by Japanese students, as they were an integral part of my experience in Hokkaido University.
